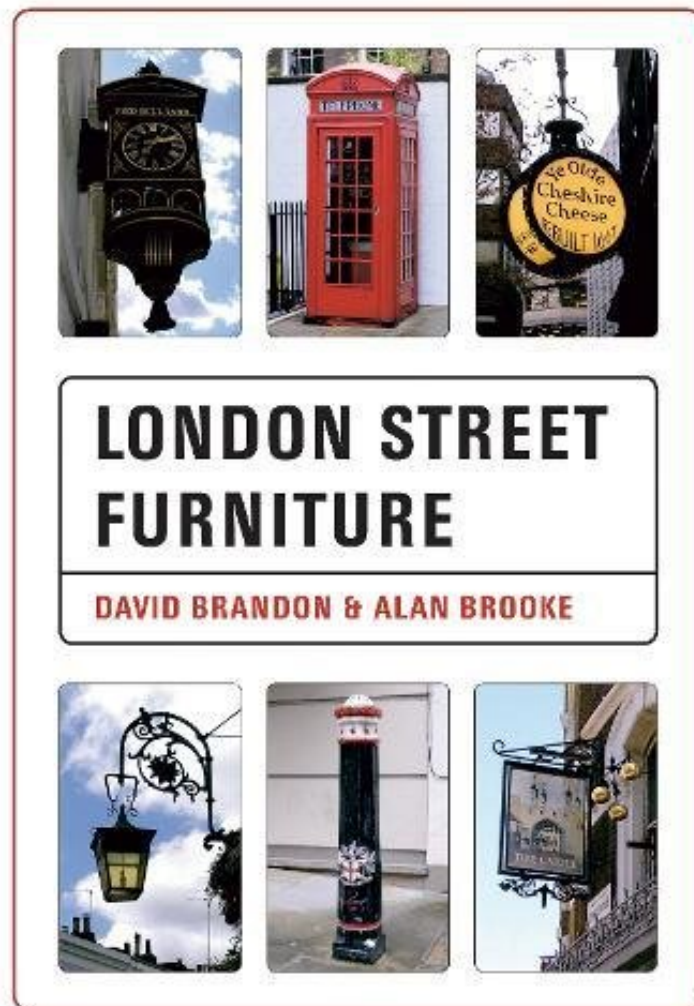


London Street Furniture
