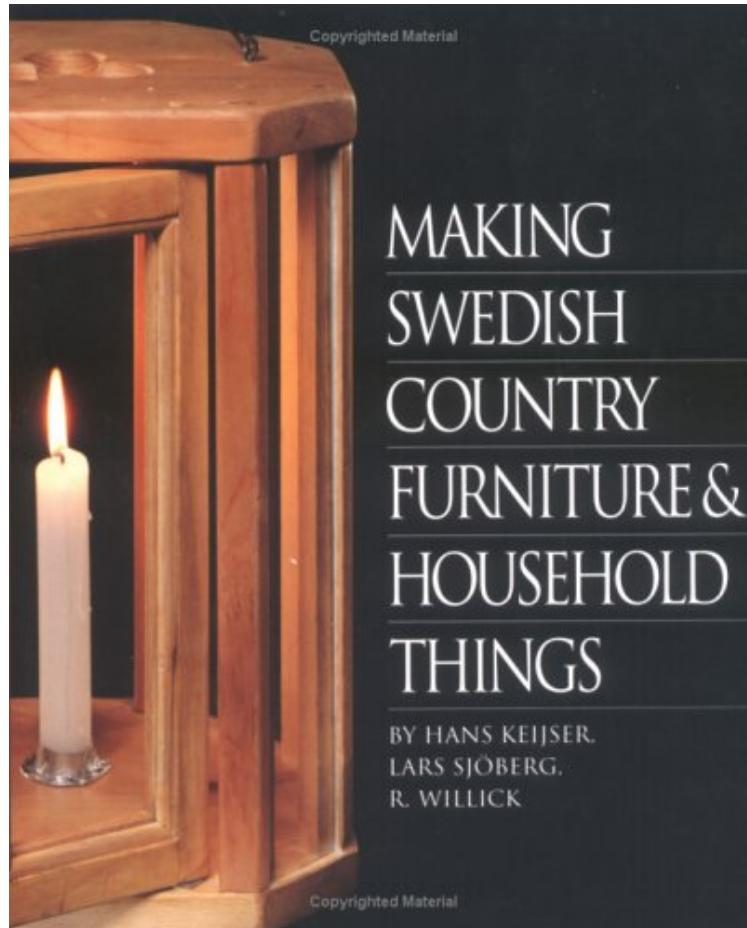

From Library Journal This adaptation of a Swedish title provides hobbyists and craftspersons with photos and measured drawings of over 35 small trays, stools, mirrors, large cabinets, chairs, and tables from various Swedish museums. A brief introduction covers wood, joints, hand tools, and finishes for the beginner. Although light on construction details, the book's plans and photos are adequate for experienced woodworkers. The design of the items is closer to early American than modern Scandinavian, and extensive collections of wood project books and woodworking magazines will not discover much new here.
