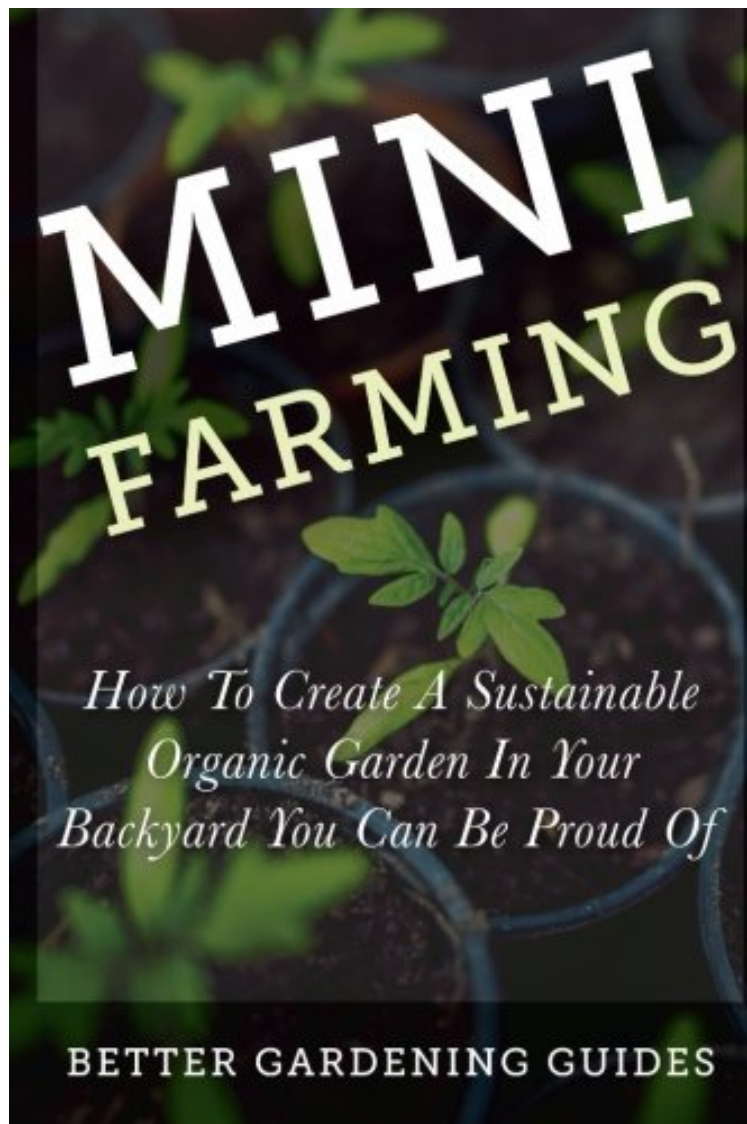

By Jayzilla I've tried doing some mini farming in my backyard with very minimal success. I'd tilled up an area of my yard that I was hoping to get things like tomatoes, greens, beans, etc into, but I've literally never been able to harvest anything from it. I was hoping this book would give me some tips from a seasoned pro on how to do this right, and ideally how to keep critters out of my garden, pots, and boxes. This book is OK. It does have some good ideas, and if you're totally new to the concept of mini farming, it could be useful for you. You probably won't be upset at spending \$3 on it. It does give some good ideas for what to grow in different ways, like trellises, boxes, and in the ground. It talks about things like irrigation, maximizing space, and insect control. It does contain some useful information. But it doesn't meet the expectation I had for it when I downloaded it, and it's missing a lot of detail I'd like to have seen (but then again, lots of detail would be in a book that costs between \$10 and \$20). It's lacking the passion and the pro tips you'd get from a book written by someone who's fought their way through container gardening and won. That's what I was looking for, because I've tried container gardening and lost. I wanted something to tell me what I was doing wrong and how to fix it. Based on my experience in blog posts, SEO writing, and ebook publishing, this book reads like it was written to sell books, not necessarily written by someone who knows what they're talking about from first hand experience. What troubles me is that someone else wrote a review saying they're a Certified Master Gardener and indicates that much of the information in the book is just wrong. I already didn't trust the authority and expertise because of how it was written and what I know about the ebook business, and that comment didn't help me gain confidence. If you're totally brand new to container gardening, you would probably find this book useful to generate ideas and teach you some basics you wouldn't have considered. I am so glad that I got this book for free because reading it was like reading an infomercial I honestly expected the last line to read "If you want to learn more buy...", and I would be pretty pissed if I had paid any money at all for this. To make the read just that much worse there were a ton of grammar mistakes in the only 40 pages that this book consists of. Unfortunately it doesn't seem to have even given me any real information about gardening, it's overall message was you can do it- information like, don't water too much, don't water too little, water right for the plant, and being successful takes work and a routine. WHAT? duh! The information contained in this book could be attained by a 10 min conversation with any employee at your local garden center. Maybe I misread the description or don't understand what mini farming actually means but I was under the impression that mini farming would be something you could do in really small spaces, this book focuses on having an acre to work with. I live in southern California and my entire lot of land isn't nearly an acre- more like a half an acre, and that has a large house on it too. Oddly enough this book also spent a significant amount of time discussing livestock like pigs and chickens- It's not even legal to have these type of animals in suburban areas like where I live. I did learn a little bit about different types of soil, although there was no discussion on how to decide what plants need what so I'm not even sure that this is useful.

I instead of repeating things several times, the author could have provided some more detail on information, like why some plants are high yielding in pots while others are not.
