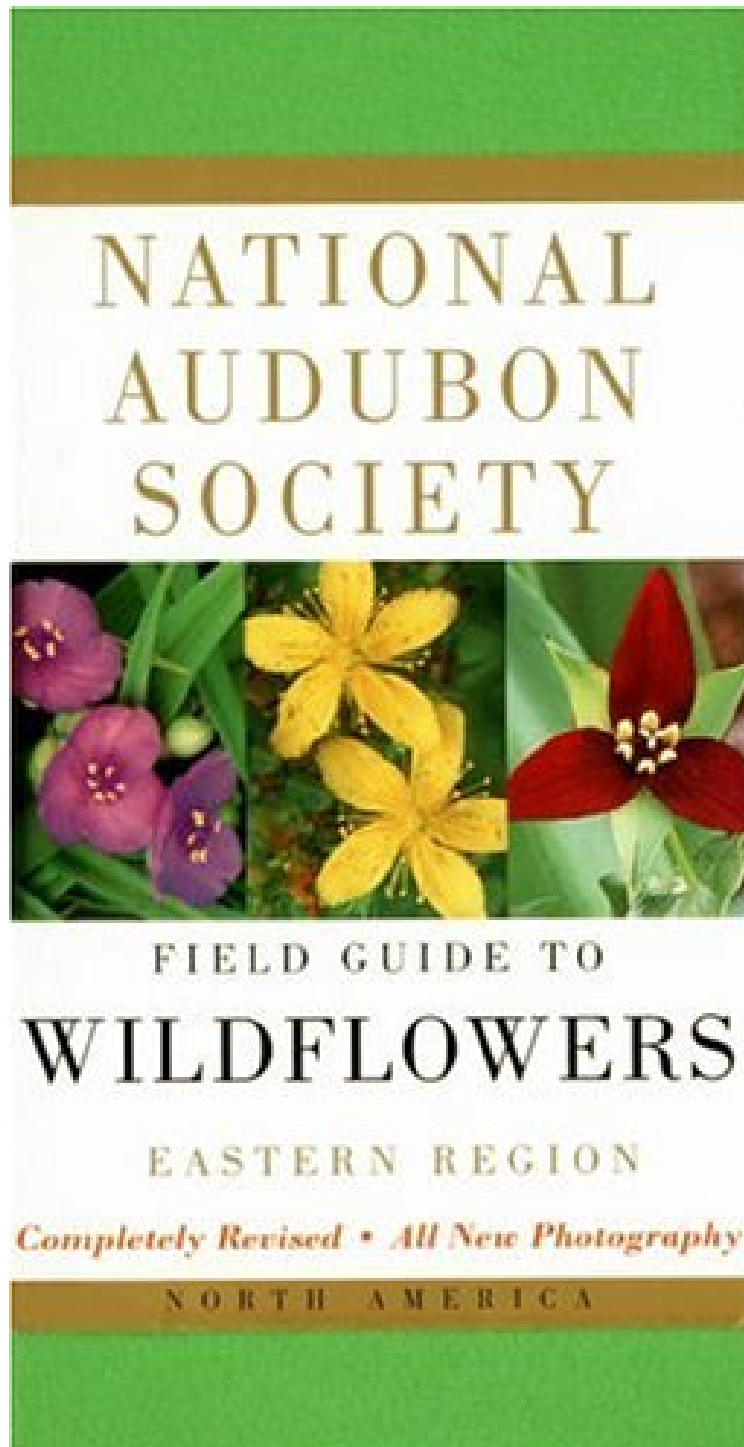

Good guide By customer The pictures are beautiful and useful most of the time, though not all of them have the leaves clear, and the leaves are important in identification. I like the fact that the pictures are all together, organized by color and shape, because I can look easily at similar flowers and narrow down which one I am dealing with. I saw clearly which kind of goldenrod I have in my yard; the yellow wood sorrel (whom a friend called clover) jumped at me from the page; I keep forgetting the celandine's name, but I can find it immediately in the pictures. It is a tad too heavy for me to take along while walking or hiking. I am using it at home to check some recently seen flowers, or going backward through the index, to see how a flower someone named for me looks like (Joe-Pye Weed recently). I give it only four stars because occasionally I cannot find what I am looking for. I prefer this book over the Peterson guide, since their black and white drawings do not appeal to me. I recommend this book warmly to all amateur flower lovers.
